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# HSS(UK) Observes Raksha Bandhan Festival

Over 120 shakhas (branches) of HSS(UK) nationally observe Raksha Bandhan with special significance. The usual tradition of sisters tying a colourful Rakhi to brothers and praying for their mutual protection takes place in Hindu homes all over the world

In the Puranic tradition, Indrani or Sachi, Lord Indra's wife, empowered the thread and tied it on to his hand on the Rakhi 'poornima'. The power of the sacred thread called Raksha helped the Gods to win the battle safely. So, this led to the continuance of tying an amulet on a man's wrist.

Thusa Rakhi is also tied to persons for their safe being, who daily put their lives in danger for the sake of others.

These persons are known as frontliners and come from all walks of life, such as Firefighters, Police staff, Ambulance staff, Military personnel, etc.

We acknowledge and pray for their safekeeping in their duty to the nation. Most of the shakhas will visit one or more local service venues and tie a Rakhi, as a symbol of protection to available staff members. Alternatively, some of these frontliners are invited to our shakha to observe the event.

The Raksha Bandhan festival invokes the sense of duty, love, and appreciation, which helps frontliners to feel that half the mission is already achieved.

The firefighters were warmly welcomed with sweets, and the event began with introductions of the participants and a brief overview about HSS UK and the importance of Rakshabandhan by Dharmesh Chheda, Vibhag Sampark Pramukh.

All Bal Balika start their presentation with Gayatri Mantra, followed by Suryanamaskar. In a fun and spirited moment, the children challenged the officers to perform Suryanamaskar, which the firefighters enthusiastically accepted.



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The officers kindly gave the children a tour of the station, showcasing the safety equipment and patiently answering their questions.

The Rakhi ceremony was a touching highlight, with the firefighters expressing their gratitude for being recognized not just as protectors of property, but of the community.

This year's event honoured the armed forces, with special guests Warrant Officer Ashok Kumar Chauhan, Sergeant Shiv Chand, and Major Hina Morjaria in attendance

Sergeant Shiv Chand reflected on his experience in the armed forces, noting that while service members come from many different backgrounds and wear different uniforms, they are united as one family. He added that the same spirit of oneness could be seen at the event, with people from all corners of the Hindu community sitting together as part of one Sangh family.

Saha Baudhik Pramukh from North London, Krish Solanki, explained the meaning of Raksha Bandhan — protection, respect, and love — extends beyond family to all who dedicate themselves to the safety and well-being of others, a form of service that parallels the armed forces' dedication to protecting the nation.

Karyakartas tied rakhis to the armed forces guests as a gesture of respect, gratitude, and solidarity. One sevika described the moment as "a way to say thank you for protecting our nation, while also showing that we stand with them as one family."

The event closed with a message that the festival's essence mirrors the great Hindu ideal of Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam — the whole world is one family — and that service, whether through military duty or community work, is a shared responsibility that unites us all.
